Alumni in Ohio roll out the red carpet early next month as the 13th annual UERMMMC alumni convention/reunion rolls into town August 2-4 at the Renaissance Hotel in downtown Cleveland.

After a year-long preparation, the host committee, headed by Dr. Norbert Bangayan, '64, put its finishing touches on all aspects of the meeting which offers recreational (golf, tennis), entertainment (dance & singing contests, youth disco), educational (8-credit hour CME), fund-raising (silent auction), business (medical school reports, association, foundation & auxiliary meetings), and social (jubilarian parties, gala) activities.

More than 400 graduates are expected to attend led by the '76 silver, '71 pearl, '66 jade, and the first '61 ruby jubilarians. Drs. Felipe Sese, UERMMMC President, Esperanza Lansang, Dean of the College of Medicine, and Henry Yanez, UERMMMCMAA (Philippines) President are coming all the way from Manila for the occasion.

An impressive array of speakers, most of whom are distinguished UERMMMC alumni (see page 10), is in store for conventioners to this "new American City." Likewise, Dr. Renato Querubin, alumni association president, said that attractive prizes for various contests also await the winners, most notably, a Ford Explorer for a hole-in-one in golf.

The highlight of the three-day gathering will be the gala night when the jubilarians are honored particularly silver who will receive their commemorative medallions and ruby who will be recognized with special gifts of appreciation for their examples to all succeeding classes.

Thirty-six 1976 grads have signed up for the reunion as the eighteen coordinators continue to work on their other classmates, Dr. Benilda Ramos-De Asis informed *The Newsletter*. She added that they firmed up their activities for the affair and are now making preparations for the Manila homecoming in cooperation with their classmates in the Philippines. Class 1966, in an update faxed to *The Newsletter*, finalized its plans for a cook-out on day 2 and a pre-gala reception on day 3.

Gaw to Deliver Cuyegkeng Memorial Lecture

Dr. Albert C. Gaw, UERMMMC Class '64, Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of California San Francisco Medical School will deliver the 2001 Dr. Jose Cuyegkeng Memorial Lecture at the annual convention on August 3 in Cleveland.

Dr. Gaw will talk on "Cultural Context in Psychotherapy" which is an application of cultural psychiatry, a subject he has researched, published, and lectured on extensively and become well-known for.

Currently an examiner for the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and the newly elected speaker-elect of the American Psychiatric Association assembly, Gaw brings to his lecture a wealth of experience and knowledge acquired through 37 years of study and hard work.

His just published paperback "Concise Guide to Cross-Cultural Psychiatry" has so far been well received. This and his other scholarly writings reflect his deep appreciation of his ethnic connection demonstrated further by his active role in establishing comprehensive health and elderly drop-in centers for Asians in Greater Boston and a bilingual day care center in Lexington.

Until his move to the West Coast in July last year, he had lived and worked in the Boston area for almost 31 years since completing his residency in psychiatry at the University of Rochester, New York. He had at different times been a lecturer at Harvard Medical School, professor at Boston University School of Medicine, director of cross-cultural psychiatry at the University of Massachusetts Medical School, and medical director at mental institutions especially the VA Hospital in Bedford, MA.

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Faculty Hone Skills For PBL

The College of Medicine in an all-out effort to implement the PBL curriculum at all levels in the new school year, conducted intensive faculty training throughout the spring. Dean Lansang reported that the program started with a workshop on curriculum evaluation and implementation on March 28-30 at the Lagos del Sol Resort, Caliraya, Laguna and ended with a series of teacher seminars throughout the month of May.

The three-day Lake Caliraya event was attended by the Dean, academic department heads, module and year level coordinators, patient-doctor team members, research coordinators, 7 medical students and two support staff.

The first day was devoted to hearing the result of faculty survey done by Dr. Teresa Yap and feedback from the students. Teachers felt "positively about being a faculty of UERMMMCC" while students "unanimously" liked the PBL program. Problems were identified in the areas of: 1) tutorial session evaluation, 2) student performance in tutorials and correlates, 3) faculty performance, 4) secretariat, 5) facilities, 6) faculty incentives, 7) clinical materials, 8) year 3 special topics, 9) research requirements, 10) written exams, and 11) faculty assignments.

Then the 69 participants broke up into 3 focus groups that tackled module designs, patient-doctor and research during the balance of the conference. Consensus drawn from the workshop was later reported to the General Faculty Meeting on April 4 in the form of recommendations. The seminar advised immediate implementation of: 1) tutorial grade revision, 2) faculty re-orientation on tutorial evaluations, patient-doctor activity, test construction, and discipline & compliance, 3) student re-orientation on PBL mechanisms, 4) faculty work enhancement, 5) support staff improvement, 6) post-exam feedback inclusion in the module schedule, 7) clear course design for special topics, 8) patient-doctor improvement, and concept maps for module. Recommended for further implementation is a laundry list of enhancements to existing facilities and resources.

As a result, the Dean said that the College held faculty workshops on test construction (preparation of questions) and evaluation (determining the minimum passing level or MPL) on May 7 and 21, then hands-on tutorials on May 18 for both new and old faculty members based on feedback from students. *Excerpts From Workshop Taskforce Report*

What is the difference?

First off, the Alumni Association (UERMMMC-MAAA, Inc.) is the body that we all belong to. It has officers and it has members. It is not a tax-exempt organization although fees and other monies paid to it may be income tax-deductible as a business expense. Under IRS Code, this organization is under 501 C (6) category.

The Alumni Foundation (UERMMMCADF, USA, Inc.) on the other hand, is a tax-exempt 501 C (3) organization. Monies and financial instruments given to it are fully tax-deductible as donations to a charitable organization.

The two organizations work hand-in-hand in disseminating information to our alumni and friends about the needs of our *Alma Mater*. The foundation is the "benevolent arm" of the association yet it is entirely independent of the association.

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Survey Says . . .

Teaching is good, facilities are fair

The first-ever student and faculty survey of the UERMMM College of Medicine undertaken by the UERMMM Alumni Foundation USA, Inc. early this year had been analyzed and the results presented to the Dean and department heads at a meeting prior to the 40th commencement exercises last April.

In the study, students in all levels rated the best and worst departments and faculty, identified the problem areas affecting their learning, and, accordingly established their priorities. For their part, the faculty members affirmed their reasons for teaching at UERM, identified areas of concern affecting their effectiveness, and suggested measures to improve the quality of their teaching.

The following is the edited report submitted by the alumni investigators: **Amuerfina T. Castro, M.A., R.N. C., Certified in Quality Assurance, Utilization Review and Risk Management, Secretary of the Foundation; El B. Castro, M.D., F.A.C.E.P., Diplomate of the American Board of Quality Assurance and Utilization Review, Chairman of the Foundation; and Nely S. Recano, M.D., F.A.C.P., Diplomate of the American Board of Quality Assurance and Utilization Review.**

Purpose: To assess the current needs of the UERMMM College of Medicine and Medical Center at large with the view of adopting changes for the improvement of projects being funded by the Foundation.

Materials and Methods: Using the QA concept of *internal and external customers*, the faculty as the former and the students the latter, two sets of questionnaires were distributed to students and faculty of the UERMMM last February to March. The completed and returned survey forms were then collated and analyzed in the U.S. using standard statistical procedures and criteria.

The student survey covered **human resources** (professors and instructors in the basic and clinical sciences), **learning environment** (library, laboratory, classrooms, campus), **concerns in the learning environment, and priority rating of these concerns.** Departments were individually rated *poor, fair, good, or excellent*, then ranked along with respective faculty members as either *best* or *least* in educating and helping students. Demographic factors like age, country, city, and undergraduate school of origin were also considered.

The faculty questionnaire asked for their **reasons** for working at UERM, **problems** affecting their performance, and **ideas** on improving the quality of teaching. Length and status of employment and areas of teacher-student interaction were also covered.

Results and Findings: Out of a total of 1,154 students, 345 (30%) responded while 28 (14%) of 228 basic and clinical faculty, both full-time and part-time, did so. Level 1 students gave the most response (41%) followed by level 3 (37%), and levels 2 & 4 (both 20%). Majority of students rated all items in human resources as *good* and those of physical set-up/learning environment as *fair*.

10 Best Professors/Instructors: Ranked from 1st to 10th are:

Level 3 - Drs. Uy, Daniel Tan, Punzalan, Albert Tan, Carlos, Chua, Que, Borromeo, Salazar, and Tuazon.

Level 4 - Drs. Soto, Cuanang, D. Tan, Carlos, Uy, Divinagracia, Bascarra, Ramos, A. Tan, and Quillamor.

Best Departments: The top three in each level are: Level 1 - Physiology, Anatomy, and Biochemistry; Level 2 - Ophthalmology, Cardiology, and Neurology; Level 3 - Physiology, Medicine, and Neurology; Level 4 - Medicine, Neurology, and Ophthalmology.

Least in Educating and Helping Students: Departments: Level 1 - Biochemistry, Preventive Medicine, Anatomy; Level 2 - Gastroenterology, Hematology, Preventive Medicine; Level 3 - Surgery, Psychiatry, Preventive Medicine; Level 4 - Surgery, Psychiatry, ENT. **Faculty:** Level 1 - Drs. Bareng, Magat-Untalan, Madarcos, Nieves, Alcantara, Aure, Paredes, Ballesteros, Sanchez, Catley; Level 2 - Drs. Marvella, Tilbe, Europa, Paraiso, Bareng, Padla, Molina, Alcantara, Divinagracia; Level 3 - Drs. Europa, Padla, Bueno, Panelo, Martinez, Paraiso, Battad, Alcedo, Doctor, Goelleague; and Level 4 - Drs. Resurreccion, Lipana, Encanto, Tilbe, Bonzola, Europa.

Learning Environment Concerns: Library (new books & journals), laboratory and specimens, classrooms and amphitheater (airconditioning, broken chairs & windows, leaking ceiling), faster computers, audiovisual aids and sound system, study area and student lounge, Aurora Blvd. (pedestrian crossing or overpass, crossing traffic light), module rooms in the clinics, cleanliness, incorrect exams, tutorial room, improve the charity hospital and facilities, demoralizing preceptors ("Tutors for patient-doctor not attending classes.").

Student Priorities: Newer books and journals for the library, better classrooms and tutorial rooms, adequate laboratory and teaching equipment, faster computers, safer pedestrian facilities for Aurora Blvd. (traffic light, overpass, crossing), and available and dedicated patient-doctor tutors and preceptors.

Faculty Responses: Reasons for Teaching at UERM: love for and fulfillment in teaching, UERM graduate, to practice one's profession/specialty, professional growth and development, to share expertise with students and residents, professional advancement, to augment income and livelihood, camaraderie and good interpersonal relationship, to serve humanity, to work with future health providers; **Problems & Concerns:** lack of patients, visual aids, diagnostic tools and teaching facilities; work overload & too many meetings; lack of management and institutional support; lecture rooms not large enough to handle big classes, poor room ventilation; lack of references and clinical materials; poor student quality (students too relaxed, lacking in motivation, initiative, and preparation, like to be spoon fed, have too much freedom); low salary (need to do moonlighting); time conflict with clinical practice (more flexibility needed); students not fluent in English or Tagalog; weather disruption of classes; faculty adjustment difficulty with PBL (better preparation needed); need to upgrade school & hospital facilities including a faculty lounge.

Limitations: Response rate was not high enough. Noted editing of student questionnaires (level notation, erasures, blanks and incomplete entries especially in rating the least effective and helpful faculty) might have discouraged students from answering

accurately for fear of retaliation, and faculty identification marks in the faculty forms might have influenced teachers into not turning in their completed forms out of concern for job security. To ensure anonymity, it is suggested that future surveys be administered by those not directly associated with the colleges or medical center like the Alumni Foundation, USA and the Alumni Association.

Conclusion: The survey results prove that the present Foundation programs on **best teacher award, faculty development, library (books, journals, audio-video tapes), teaching materials and equipment, and recycling for charity** are all necessary to maintain and improve the quality of education in our *Alma Mater*. These data and those of periodic surveys in the future will be used to evaluate and implement changes in ongoing projects of the Alumni Foundation so that quality can be assured..
